And the Silver Goes To...???

No, the Winter Olympics haven't come to Toronto but the silver anniversary of the foundation of St John the Compassionate Mission did arrive in January this year. 25 years since the Mission opened its doors on Blake Street! We knew it was coming of course but the question was how to commemorate this event. A big posh party some how didn't seem appropriate for a community living with the poor and marginalized. Then out of the blue, (as so often happens at St John's), up popped the solution when we got a request from Bob and his family to provide a weekend meal for 150 people.

A date near the actual date of the opening of the Mission was agreed upon – Sunday January 23rd. Posters and flyers were produced advertising a 25th Birthday Party for St John's to which all were welcome. The first 25 through the door to get gatecrasher prizes. A new invention - the St John Cake – was invented! There is a Greek tradition of a cake baked in honour of St Basil whose feast falls on the first day of the New Year. The Vasilopota, as it is called, is given to people who have made a significant contribution to parish life to honour them for their work in the year past. An extra bonus is that somewhere inside the cake is a special coin. The St John Cake (with 25 candles of course) was to be given to each person who came, to honour them for being themselves, and there was not one, but two coins. But this is to get ahead of the event itself.

The first problem to address was how to set up the hall. Who would come? How many would come? We didn't really expect 150 people on a cold Sunday night but we played safe and set up for as many as we could accommodate. The tables were decorated; vast numbers of balloons and streamers were floating around to create a festive atmosphere. The food was ready; servers were standing by ready to leap into action, the music from the fiddlers was spreading creating a party mood – but how many would come to eat all this beautifully prepared food? The answer was not long in coming as cold hands starting beating on the doors demanding entrance and enter they did in droves and in moments the place was full up with still more waiting for a place at the tables.

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St John's Academy

The New Year began in earnest at St John's Academy, as several new students began their after-school tutoring with their mentors. Students have been very motivated in their learning and attend regularly.

On Saturday, January 22, we held a study skills workshop, led by Emily, our co-op student. There were 6 participants who braved the exceedingly cold temperatures, to experience a workshop on organizing their work, as well as study strategies to succeed in exams and assignments.

Students from grades 6 to 9, who need help in English or Math, may apply for tutoring in the Academy, at any time in the school year. The tutoring is free, except for a nominal registration fee. Students are assessed and matched with a suitable tutor. Currently, we have 18 students, some of whom attend twice weekly.

We also have a solid, dedicated group of mentors (tutors) who volunteer their time to help students succeed in English or Math. Thank you to all the mentors, who have made this program a success, there are 15 active mentors at present.

I encourage any adult who is interested in volunteer their time for one hour a week, to consider become a mentor in this program. Your interest and dedication will have a lasting impact on the next generation, and in due course, will produce lasting benefits for everyone in our society.

My Experience

My name is Emily; I am a second year social service student at George Brown College. I am currently in my last month of placement here at St John the Compassionate Mission. I work here from Monday to Thursday, and on Saturdays.

On Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday I work in the academy with Bodh. The academy is a tutoring program, for students grade six to nine, in Math and English. I tutor about four students a week. The academy is a great program and you see the difference it makes in these kids' lives.

When I am not tutoring and at the academy, on Wednesdays I help with the Food for Family program with Naomi. I help with set up, taking people through, and sometimes keep the appointment book. The Food for Families goes from one o'clock to four o'clock. Also, I help with Naomi with the family activity night, which is now in the afternoon and parents do not have to stay with their kids. We had to change the time, because we could not get enough people out at night. Although I was not there for the first afternoon, I heard that there were about six kids that came. Each week we do something different - anything from baking to crafts.

Although my placement here is coming to an end, because I have to go back to classes, I plan to still continue to tutor two students a week, one on Tuesday and one on Thursday. When I finish classes, I plan to come back and help with the Food for Families again. Working

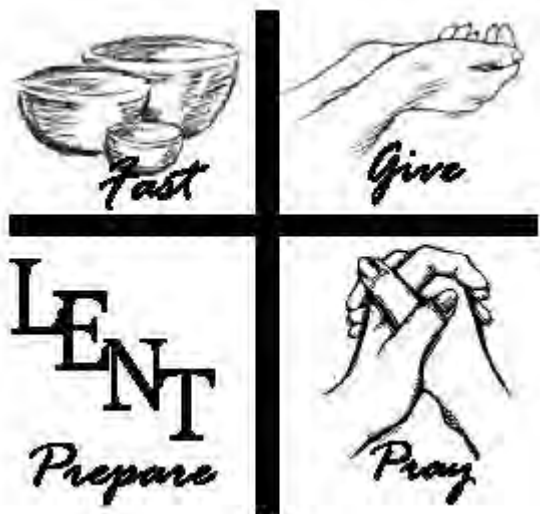

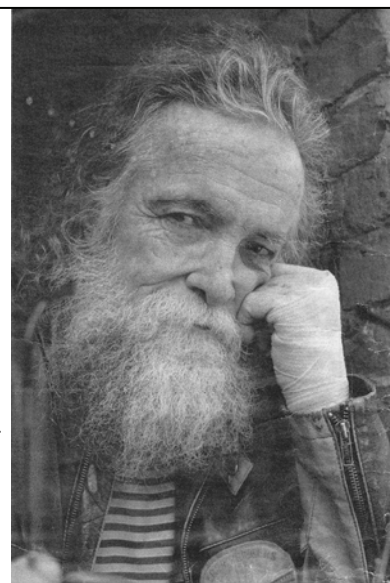

Richard made the headlines in the Star and other news pages for successfully winning a case against the police who assaulted him; (meaning: broken ribs, broken finger, dislocated shoulder, scrapes and bruises) last April, 2010 outside his home on Gerrard St East. The Police tried to accuse Richard (who is disabled) of being drunk when they beat him up but this was proven as false.

Richard’s case is not unique but because of being stubborn and of “*Braveheart*” Scottish stock he did not stop until the truth was exposed to the light.
